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## **Children, young people, vulnerability for COVID-19\***

The nature and extent of the impact depend on several vulnerability factors:

- the developmental age, educational status, pre-existing mental health condition, being economically underprivileged or being quarantined due to infection /fear of infection.
- Young children show clinginess, disturbed sleep, nightmares, poor appetite, inattentiveness, and separation problems.

### C&YP are more vulnerable than adults during the pandemic\*

• Immature cognitive and emotional regulation systems

• Tend to show more negative psychological outcomes

• Anxiety, -18% in adults, 22% in Children & Adolescents in China

Internet Addiction and Related Psychological Factors Among Children and Adolescents in China During the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Epidemic

Huixi Dong<sup>1\*</sup>, Fangru Yang<sup>1</sup>, Xiaozi Lu<sup>2</sup> and Wei Hao<sup>3</sup>

- 2.68% addictive Internet user, 33.37% problematic Internet users
- Internet usage grown during the COVID-19 epidemic (both frequency, duration and stay-up Internet)
- Female\*, age, depression, and stress, were correlated with the IA

\*14 years, girl, cultural divide from parents, sleep disturbance, grades went down...

#### Ecological Factors

Obesogenic environment Decreased physical activity Weight bias/stress

#### **Biological Factors**

Low grade inflammation Chronic stress effects Decreased immune function

#### Ecological Factors Social distancing Less physical activity options Work/home life disruptions

#### **Biological Factors**

Hyperinflammatory state Acute stress effects Decreased immune function

# Focus on the vulnerable\*

- Gaming,-an unhealthy coping mechanism among the vulnerable
- **Post-pandemic persistence of excessive gaming** and resultant negative consequences.
- Vulnerable groups, require the mental health care during the pandemic.
- Early identification and help overcome the mental health challenges

## 'Triage-model' to prioritize essential services during COVID-19

- **Category 'A':** Need to attend the clinical services without which may face health complications, *e.g. children receiving anti-epileptic medication*
- Category 'B': May choose to attend or postpone, the decision left with parents, *e.g. children receiving neuroleptic medication*.
- Category 'C': Advised to come in Sep. 2020 for follow-up
